We're sad to report that we've lost two of our members recently, Roland Gangloff and Ernie Ganas.



EAA June Flight Safety Report


The topics we have discussed up to this point have been focused on the recognition of internal and external factors that affect the safe operation of our flights.

We looked at lessons learned from accidents and incidents to learn from their mistakes, and at human factors topics that are a little more nuanced, but have a significant impact on the safe operation of our flights.

As part of our understanding of the factors that we must consider to make rational decisions, let's work backwards a bit and discuss some aerodynamic principles that are the foundation of flight and how they impact all aerospace vehicles from a Taylorcraft to Boeing 747.

We do not need to have the level of understanding of aerodynamic principles as an aeronautical engineer, but simply a level of understanding that will enable us to apply aerodynamic principles to our everyday flights.

The basic principles of flight revolve around the four fundamental forces of flight: thrust, lift, drag, and weight. These forces work together to enable an aircraft to take off, maintain flight, and land.



Sir George Cayley is credited with the creation of the science of flight. Cayley became the first to identify the basic problems of heavier-than-air flight, the first to carry out basic aerodynamic research, and the first to discover that curved surfaces produce more lift than flat ones. In 1799, Cayley drew up the earliest known plans for a fixed-wing aircraft

We tend to focus on the Wright brothers, who achieved the first sustained and controlled flight of a heavier-than-air machine on December 17, 1903, at Kill Devil Hills, North Carolina, but the initial science of flight goes back to Sir George Cayley's research.

In future discussions, we will look at the different aspects of the principles of flight, and how we manipulate these forces.

EAA 1268 Board of Directors Meeting May 13, 2025

President Robin Tatman called the meeting to order at 6:10 pm

Marsi reported that Ilario Gallo has offered to serve breakfast at Young Eagle events. Suitable dishes like breakfast burritos were discussed.

Robin presented a list of updates needed for the Saturday BBQs. Extensive discussion on how to coordinate and update the system. There are multiple lists, including the sign-up calendar, inventory, coordinators, positions to be filled and many more.

Clarification was provided for shopping assignments, including Robin and Darrel always taking care of the drinks.

Board Meeting adjourned 6:40 pm

General Membership Meeting called to order by President Robin Tatman 7:45 pm.

Robin thanked Wayne and Celia Schake and Ligia and Don Booker for the delicious dinner of carnitas, salad, rice and beans and ice-cream bars for dessert.

Robin and Darrel brought the membership up to date on the discussion at the Board Meeting regarding the Saturday BBQ event. It was mentioned that April was a very successful months with proceeds of \$1000. Treasury Report by Ray Gallarate: Checking \$2,762.94, Savings \$15,621.57, CD \$20,138.73, Burgers \$1,009.71, Dues \$40.00,

The speaker for the evening was Will Campbell. Will and Ray Gallarate, took off from Schellville airport to San Francisco Bay to do a photo shoot of the last flight of the historic Martin Philippine Mars on its journey from Vancouver, B.C. to its final destination the Pima Air and Space Museum, AZ. The 5 US Navy Flying Boats, were: the Marianas-, the Marshall-, the Caroline-, the Philippine- and the Hawaiian Flying boats. They were the largest ones ever built with a wingspan of about 200 ft and 100 ft. long, original built as longrange patrol and cargo boats during WWII. After the war several were transitioned to civilian use as firefighting water bombers. They could carry 7,200 gallons of water or fire retardant and 2 of the aircraft dropped over 50 million gallons of water during their lifetime.
